Overview of SAC

Art discussed who had joined the SAC and that the team will be reaching out to alternate members to increase our numbers.

W9/MOU

Courtney asked that everyone turn in their MOU/W9 docs and that if they will not be accepting payment, they email Courtney to let her know.

Review of In-Person Planning Meeting

- Art informed the group that we would be putting together a metric of responses from the in-person planning session, and sending it out to everyone.
- Art reviewed some of the responses from the in-person activity and asked for further input from stakeholders
 - Rev. Mark Blue suggested that we add the Buffalo History Museum to partner with to get out information about the history of Buffalo Sewer.
 - Rosie suggested the use of a presentation she has that could be a good lead in for getting information on the history of Buffalo Sewer

- Aria suggested an online forum to utilize so that we could offer incentives to do a survey (such as an online prize wheel)
 - Dr. Solomon-Carter will get information on an online forum used to distribute incentives.
- Walt emphasized that this is just the beginning and we will continue to build on the responses as the program grows.

Overview of QCCW Public Participation Plan

- Rosie presented on Buffalo Sewers Public Participation Plan
 - Rev. Mark Blue asked that a copy of the Public Participation Plan be shared with the SAC, Rosie stated that the plan could be sent out after the meeting.
- Rosie explained that certain individual projects are larger and warrant their own Public Participation Plan so there may be multiple throughout this program.
- Rosie discussed that legal requirements for public participation are that they need to hold at least one public meeting in person and online, but they are planning on doing much more than that
- Walt indicated that certain components for public meetings are being considered, such as offering childcare at these meetings so that parents can bring their children.
- Rosie emphasized that public meetings will be specific to where they are held, therefore they will be going to each council district and focus specifically on the projects that will be occurring in those individual council districts. There are too many projects to go over them all for each meeting.
- Art stated that we will be reaching out to each council district to set meetings specific to their districts regarding the program.

Community Partnership Program

- Walt said that the CPP would seek meaningful partnerships and leverage the projects completed via QCCWI to ensure that they will benefit the community.
- > Walt stated that the CPP will focus on 4 core areas:
 - o Education
 - Workforce Development
 - Economic Development
 - Public and Environmental Health
- Art discussed the type of partnerships that could be created via the CPP (Say Yes, Northland Workforce Training Center, Buffalo Center for Health Equity, The Exchange at Beverly Grey, etc.)
- Tyra Johnson-Hux expressed concerns over how we describe things within the program. She stated that things are constantly changing and asked if there are any discussions on how we describe these initiatives within the community. We need to ensure that we remain mindful when utilizing certain terms such as equity, or justice. There may be some pushback from how things are described.

- Rosie stated that the majority of the program is funded from NYS
- > Walt discussed further the specifics of the CPP
- Walt concluded discussions on the CPP by mentioning that the CPP framework document is still under review, but once it is finished it will be shared with the SAC.
- Tyra Johnson-Hux asked if we have had conversations with NYPA on how they are contracting MWBEs for their program, she suggested they may be able to share best practices. Art asked if Tyra could share a contact from NYPA to reach out to. Tyra stated that she can make an introduction. Asantewa Holley can also put us in touch with NYPA, she just needs a bit further info. Tyra also shared a flyer in the chat for an upcoming event for MWBE's. The flyer is attached to the end of this document. She also will be sharing a flyer with Courtney for an ambassador's breakfast on March 5th.
- Art mentioned that we have not spoken with NYPA, but we are working with the Buffalo Bills on their similar program.

Misc.

- Board of Block Clubs meeting is upcoming on Feb. 27th, at Roswell Comprehensive Institute
- Sandy Smith stated that she could give a spiel about some of the work Buffalo Niagara Waterkeeper is doing on some of its projects
- Art asked Sandy to send an email with a list of their events
- Art mentioned that our engagement site is upcoming and will be revealed to the stakeholders in March sometime.





